Never doubt that a small, group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has.



Professor Wong Tat Meng will take over as the Vice Chancellor of Wawasan Open University from middle of December 2009. Prof Wong is already a familiar figure in the Malaysian education scene, having played a key role in the establishment of WOU as well as serving as the University's Deputy Vice Chancellor (Academic) since its inception. With over 35 years' experience in both conventional and ODL universities in Malaysia and Hong Kong, Prof Wong's current interests are in curriculum development, quality assurance and change management.

The Sultan Abdul Hamid College, Alor Star 'old boy' received his BSc (Hons) and PhD in Zoology from the University of Otago, Dunedin in New Zealand in 1972. His study there was funded through a NZ Colombo Plan Scholarship (1965–1972). For his postgraduate studies, he was also awarded a New Zealand Postgraduate Scholarship (1969–1972). He then returned to join the newly established Universiti Sains Malaysia where he served for the next 21 years in various academic and administrative positions including Lecturer, Associate Professor, Chairman of Programmes, Deputy Dean and Dean of the School of Biological Sciences as well as the Foundation Director of the University's Centre for Marine and Coastal Studies.

While at USM, Prof Wong's research interests focused on the environmental physiology of inter-tidal invertebrates, pollution studies, benthic

crustaceans and bivalve aquaculture. He conducted pioneering studies into the artificial breeding and production of bivalve seeds using hatchery techniques in the early 1980s. His team at the Muka Head station was the first in the country to successfully induce spawned and artificially-reared juveniles of many Malaysian bivalve species including the blood cockle, mussel, carpet shell clam, razor clam and two species of oysters. They were also the first to document the spawning and larval development process in these species through the use of video recording technology. His research has been disseminated through numerous journal papers and conference presentations both locally and internationally.

During his career, Prof Wong has received a number of fellowship awards including the Commonwealth Fellowship (1979), University of Rhode Island Visiting Scholar (1987) and the IDRC Travelling Fellowship (1987). He successfully completed a number of consultancy projects for international agencies such as the ILO (Netherlands), IDRC (Canada), the Shell Group of Companies, ASEAN Foundation and others. Prof Wong had also contributed actively to local professional and learned societies, having served as President of the USM Academic Staff Association (1975–76), Council member of the Malaysian Scientific Association (1982–84) as well as President of the Malaysian Society of Marine Sciences (1985–87).

In 1993, Prof Wong joined the Open Learning Institute of Hong Kong (later upgraded to the Open University of Hong Kong) as Dean of its School of Science and Technology. He was promoted to Chair Professor and Dean in 1995 and held the post until 2006 when he was invited back to Penang to join the newly established Wawasan Open University.

Court-ing excellence!

When not burning the midnight oil and swotting up on the sex lives of oysters, crabs and clams, Prof Wong was an all-round sportsman, and an accomplished badminton exponent back in the days when Malaysia were genuine Thomas Cup contenders and wooden racquets and pristine white kits were the norm. He represented the Kedah state team while still a lower secondary schoolboy.


During his 'varsity' days in New Zealand, Prof Wong earned an Otago University Blue for badminton in 1965 and was also awarded the New Zealand Combined Universities Blue for badminton over four consecutive years from 1965 to 1968! He also won the New Zealand Open Championship in 1965 as part of the Men's doubles. He regularly plays tennis at the Penang Sports Club to keep fit. Even at a 'youthful' 65, he can still deliver a 'thunderbolt' serve and a 'killer' smash.

His immediate objective is to make Wawasan Open University the preferred institution of higher learning for the country's working adults and their employers.

WOU hosts global economic experts







The sixth instalment of Khazanah Nasional Bhd's Penang Lecture series brought together two eminent personalities, Prof KS Jomo and Datuk Seri Panglima Andrew Sheng, to WOU's main campus on 6 August 2009.

Prof Jomo, a leading scholar and expert on the political economy of development, spoke on "The Global Economic Crisis and Its Impact on Asia". He currently holds the position of Assistant Secretary General for Economic Development in the UN's Department of Economic and Social Affairs (DESA).

Meanwhile Andrew Sheng, who moderated the talk, is a director of Khazanah Nasional Bhd and chief adviser to the China Banking Regulatory Commission. He was recently appointed as an expert member of the National Economic Advisory Council (NEAC).

Jomo explained that most developing countries are innocent victims in a global economy that practises double standards. He observed that China and India were currently the two best performing economies due to stringent capital controls they had imposed earlier, which allowed them to weather the current crisis far better than most developed countries.

He quoted social data from the International Labour Organisation which indicated that over 200 million more of the global workforce will be poorer, while unemployment figures will rise by 51 million. Social unrest caused by the crisis will be rampant, while US intelligence reports suggest that the crisis is now posing the greatest security risk to international stability.

The lecture culminated with a Q & A session chaired by Khazanah's Vice President of Strategy and Investment Research, Hamdan Majeed. Prof Jomo and Sheng responded to questions from the audience, which included Federation of Malaysian Manufacturers (FMM) northern branch chairman Dato' O K Lee, businessman Dato' Dr Neoh Soon Bin, Bukit Bendera Member of Parliament Liew Chin Tong, WOU Vice Chancellor Tan Sri Emeritus Prof Gajaraj Dhanarajan, USM's Prof Dato' Anwar Fazal, and Consumers Association of Penang (CAP) president S M Mohd Idris.

OUUK visit to WOU



A team from The Open University, UK recently paid a courtesy visit on WOU Chancellor Tan Sri Emeritus Prof Gajaraj Dhanarajan and Acting Vice Chancellor Prof Wong Tat Meng on 5 August 2009.

Dr Nicholas Watson, the Project Director of The Open University Business School's pilot Global MBA, and Chris Vincent, an independent market analyst who manages a range of international projects, were accompanied by Peggy Lim, Director of the British Council Penang and Sara Goh from Pearson Malaysia.

The OUUK visitors also held a separate meeting with Prof Wong, Deputy Vice Chancellor (Operations) Dr Seah Soo Aun, School of Business and Administration (SBA) Dean Prof Chee Kim Loy, lecturer Dr Teoh Ai Ping, and Corporate Communications Director Agnes James.

Roundtable discussion on the use of English in teaching Science and Mathematics

Wawasan Open University and SEDAR Institute organised a roundtable discussion at the Kuala Lumpur Regional Office on 17 July 2009 to discuss the Education Ministry's announcement to abolish the policy of the Teaching of Science and Mathematics in English (PPSMI) starting in 2012.

WOU's Dean of the School of Education, Languages and Communications (SELC), Assoc Prof Dr Malachi Edwin Vethamani headed the panel discussion, with speakers including Prof Dr Kuldip Kaur from Open University Malaysia (OUM), Prof Dr John Arul Phillips from Asia e University (AeU) and Dr Ganakumaran Subramaniam from the Malaysian English Language Teaching Association (MELTA).

Dr Ganakumaran said that although teaching Science and Mathematics in the students' mother tongue may make the subjects more accessible and allowed better achievement in the subjects, there was a possible loss of opportunities from not learning English especially when students moved on to tertiary education.

A medical professional shared with the participants that out of 1.56 billion Internet users in the world, 465 million use English on the net; two thirds of the world's scientists publish their research findings in English and all international forums are conducted in English. He felt that the benefits of teaching Science and Mathematics in English were too important to ignore. However a Tamil-medium school representative believed the use of mother tongue languages was critical for students to perform well in Science and Mathematics.



Another participant remarked that middle-class parents are aware that students educated in English tend to flourish and revealed that his law firm has rejected many local graduates due to their low levels of English proficiency. He observed that middle-class students have access to English outside of government schools and are thus more likely to excel, leaving students from lower-income backgrounds further behind and widening the economic gap.



Most participants felt that while some students may benefit more from the increased opportunities of learning in English, other students may need to use their mother tongue. Many agreed that the decision to abolish the policy of teaching Science and Mathematics in English was made without adequate consultation from academicians and the public.

A few felt that the failure of the policy of teaching Science and Mathematics in English was due to poor implementation rather than the wrong choice of policy. Prof Kuldip lamented on the poor quality of teaching in Malaysia and the need for better education standards and implementation.

Prof John Arul said the quality of education was a more important issue than the actual choice of language of instruction. He reminded the audience that the primary purpose of teaching Science and Mathematics in English was not to improve English standards, but to allow better access to the fields of Science and Mathematics which see ongoing research and developments in English.

In wrapping up, WOU Deputy Vice Chancellor Unni Kumaran Menon said that the government should listen to the people rather than make policies on its own. He called for a separation of the education policy from political influence, and for the formation of a Commission of Education to oversee educational policies. About 30 participants from academia, schools, NGOs and the government sector, attended the roundtable discussion.

Given that small and medium enterprises (SMEs) account for nearly 90% of all the businesses in Malaysia, it makes economic sense to strengthen these organisations. Speaking at a public seminar – "Making the Best of What We Have" – Associated Chinese Chamber of Commerce and Industry secretary general Tan Sri Soong

Siew Hoong explained that in manufacturing terms, an SME is an enterprise with no more than 150 full-time employees or an annual sales turnover not exceeding RM25 million. The seminar was organised by the Penang Gerakan Industry Development Bureau.

Tan Sri Soong believed that the current global meltdown is worse than the mid-90s Asian financial crisis since it affects the entire economy and not just the financial and banking institutions. "The crisis especially affects economies like Malaysia which are dependent on exports of manufactured products. Our three main importing partners are the US, European Union and Japan, which take up 40% of our exports."

He declared that foreign direct investments have shrunk as developed countries are focused on their home economies before they even consider investing in Malaysia. He asked, "Is our environment attractive enough to draw them here?" He added, "Our labour is not that cheap, there are not enough skilled workers," and suggested that the government should

be co-operative.

Tan Sri Soong said that the federal government's economic stimulus packages are focused on human resource development to make Malaysian workers "more productive, effective and innovative". The government has also abolished policies not conducive for investment, such as requiring 30% Bumiputra equity and requiring approval from the foreign investment committee.

Federation of Malaysian Manufacturers (FMM) vice president Dato' Dr Ir Andy Seo Kian Haw spoke on how to speed up delivery of financial support from the government departments, while organisation development expert Kam Lian Hooi explained how to make the best out of the support provided by the government and the private sector. The well-attended talk was officiated by State Gerakan chairman Dato' Dr Teng Hock Nan.

The half-day seminar held at WOU's main campus on 15 August 2009 aimed to create public awareness on the federal government's first and second economic stimulus packages to help business communities and industries weather the current global economic crisis.



WOU joins the International Council for Open and Distance Education

Since August 2009, Wawasan Open University has been an institutional member of the International Council for Open and Distance Education (ICDE); linking WOU to a global network of over 100 institutions specialising in open, distance and ICT-based education (ICDE members come from 140 different countries).

According to WOU Acting Vice Chancellor Prof Wong Tat Meng, the linkage will enable WOU to explore areas of possible collaboration and capacity building opportunities at strategic and operational levels with leading member institutions in ICDE.

"Top institutions and the key movers of open and distance education have a wealth of knowledge and experience that we can tap into via the ICDE platform. Our staff can benefit from the sharing of new technologies and methodologies to bring about improvements in our delivery of open and distance education," he added.

Members of ICDE have access to Open Praxis, the electronic journal of the ICDE that publishes articles on trends and relevant topics of interest in the field of flexible learning and open education.

About the ICDE

ICDE is affiliated with the United Nations through UNESCO and serves as the global umbrella membership organisation in online, flexible and blended learning, including e-learning and distance education.

Established in 1938, ICDE aims primarily to promote intercultural co-operation and understanding through flexible and online learning around the globe.

ICDE is also an affiliate member of the South East Asian Ministers of Education Organisation (SEAMEO) and a World Bank partner organisation. Its permanent secretariat has been based in Oslo, Norway since 1988.


Participants were required to locate 10 purple icons which each carried a netiquette tip and come up with a creative slogan starting with "Good netiquette at the workplace is important because...".


PENANG – Prof Wong welcomes the students at WOU's main campus in Penang.

WOU welcomes new students

The start of WOU's sixth semester saw over 600 new students attending Orientation Days across the nation in Penang, Kuala Lumpur, Ipoh and Johor on 19 July 2009; students on the East Coast attended their Orientation Day in Kota Bharu a day earlier.

At the main campus, the freshmen were introduced to Penang Regional Office director K Manoharan and his staff, academics and tutors. A pre-recorded welcome address by Vice Chancellor Tan Sri Emeritus Prof Gajaraj Dhanarajan was screened, and Acting Vice Chancellor Prof Wong Tat Meng extended a warm welcome to the students, reiterating in his speech the University's commitment and readiness to help students in their educational journey.

All the new students attending the day-long Orientation Day at the five locations were briefed on WOU's IT facilities, WawasanLearn, online submission of assignments, and the digital library resources available. The comprehensive session on study skills and TMA preparation taught the students how to study smart and work on assignments.

There was a separate briefing on CeMBA and CeMPA by Prof Chee while the undergraduates were exposed to the learning support system and services.

The encounter between a Communist central party commander and an Indian rubber estate medical dresser near a wooden bridge provides the prelude for the theatrical performance, At A Plank Bridge, held at the WOU main campus from 24–25 July 2009. The two characters were convincingly portrayed by WOU's very own Lim Yao-han as Fook Leong, and theSun newspaper northern region bureau chief Himanshu Bhatt as Chandran.

The story unfolds with Fook Leong, a resistance fighter in the Malayan People's Anti-Japanese Army (MPAJA), on his way to Singapore riding a bicycle when he literally bumps into Chandran, who's pulling a bullock cart. As the duo exchange words at the plank bridge, their personal stories and reasons for heading south to Singapore are gradually revealed.

Meanwhile Chandran, a former "Death Railway" camp worker in Thailand, hopes to join his wife and kids in Singapore. He has packed important documents from the rubber estate he used to work in into gunny sacks loaded onto his bullock cart. These documents are his prized possessions as they contain the medical and death records of all the estate workers; Chandran plans to turn over the records to the British in Singapore so these can be historically preserved.

The drama concludes on a fittingly tragic note with the sound and headlights of an approaching Japanese lorry, before gunfire erupts and Fook Leong falls down dead on the cart.

A first for 'Plank Bridge'

Plank Bridge written by Kannan Menon was staged for the first time in Malaysia by the Penang-based theatre group Cape Poetics as part of the Art International Penang festival to commemorate the first anniversary of George Town's listing as a Unesco World Heritage Site. The theatre performance directed by Jayaram Menon follows a highly successful off-Broadway staging of the play in New York in January 2003.

About 200 people attended the performance at WOU – among them were WOU Vice Chancellor Tan Sri Emeritus Prof Gajaraj Dhanarajan and wife Puan Sri Sue, Penang Heritage Trust president Dr Choong Sim Poey, and Kannan Menon.

Learning Innovations in Higher Education

Open University Malaysia (OUM) recently hosted the Ninth International Conference on Information (ICI9) from 12-13 August 2009, together with coorganisers, Eszterhazy Karoly College, Hungary, Cadi Ayyad University Marrakesh, Morocco, and Delta University al-Mansoura, Egypt.

The aim of ICI9 was to share the latest cuttingedge knowledge and technology available to open learning institutions to impart information to recipients in the best possible ways. ICI9 was a platform to share ideas, views and experiences in introducing, using, sustaining and innovating new technologies for open learning in line with the Conference's theme "Learning Innovations in Higher Education."

WOU Vice Chancellor Tan Sri Emeritus Prof Gajaraj Dhanarajan was a keynote speaker at ICI9. The abstract of his paper on 'Technology and Learning: Building Capacity, Managing Change' is provided below.

Abstract

Global economic and development changes and challenges are fast and furious. The pace of change is requiring nations to produce a faster, smarter and better calibre of human being, not just a few in numbers but entire communities of such individuals. Our current systems of human development are impeding the rate at which this should be happening. Future education systems, some of them already

in the making, have to be designed from policy to practice, exploiting the full potential of technologies for nation building, social inclusiveness and economic benefit. At the same time those in charge of managing these technology driven systems will require new skills, knowledge, and insight. They also need to develop new partnerships and be prepared for greater accountabilities and transparencies. This paper deals with the changes and challenges required in the practice and provision of education with the constant arrival of new learning technologies into the learning environment.
