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Wawasan Open University (WOU)'s founding Chancellor Tun Dato' Seri Utama Dr Lim Chong Eu has accepted reappointment for another three-year term commencing 5 May 2010.

The entire WOU learning community welcomes this wonderful news as Tun Lim is a truly distinguished gentleman of immense intellect and great wisdom besides being a great statesman. He has also left a significant imprint and influence over the growth of higher learning in Malaysia.

As Chief Minister of Penang from 1969-1990, Tun Lim has contributed tremendously towards the socio-economic development of the state and the nation. For his immense service and contributions to society he received numerous awards and honours, among which are the order of the Rising Sun, Gold and Silver from Emperor Akihito of Japan, the Darjah Utama Pangkuan Negeri (DUPN) from TYT Governor of Penang and the Seri Makhota Malaysia (SSM) from the Yang Di Pertuan Agong which carries the title 'Tun'. In addition, Tun Lim has been conferred Honorary Doctorates by Universiti Sains Malaysia as well as his alma mater Edinburgh University.

Chairman of WOU Council, Tun Dr Lim Keng Yaik, remarked that Tun Lim has honoured WOU by accepting this reappointment. He said, "As the driver of the modernisation and industrialisation of Penang when he became the Chief Minister in 1969, he has attracted huge foreign direct investment and created thousands of jobs." He added that WOU was set up in Penang to "complement Tun Lim's efforts by providing flexible, affordable and accessible opportunities for the country's workforce to improve their knowledge and skills through distance learning to move up the value chain.

As the Chancellor, we look forward to him for guidance towards achieving this goal."

Wawasan Education Foundation (WEF) Chairman Dato' Seri Stephen Yeap described Tun Lim as "a far-sighted visionary and one of Penang's greatest treasures". He stated, "Tun Lim's passion propelled this State to great heights at a time of crisis and struggle. He belonged to a rare breed of politicians with a formidable intellect and a great sense of selflessness. For me personally, he has been a kind mentor and a good friend, and I am truly confident WOU will continue to flourish under his wise counsel."

WOU founding Vice Chancellor (2005-2009) Tan Sri Emeritus Prof Gajaraj Dhanarajan declared, "The WEF exercised its right with insight and wisdom in re-appointing Tun Lim as the Chancellor of WOU for a second term. Very few leaders in our country bring the stature and respect to the office as Tun Lim does."

Meanwhile WOU Vice Chancellor Prof Dr Wong Tat Meng welcomed the re-appointment stating that "Tun Lim Chong Eu's continuous quest for knowledge and his visionary ideas will inspire the whole Wawasan Open University to greater heights as a Centre of Excellence for Open Distance Learning and the Preferred Partner for all adult learners and their employers seeking to enhance productivity in the workplace."


In preparation for this, the CeMBA programme is currently undergoing a full accreditation exercise by the Malaysian Qualifications Agency. Having submitted all the relevant documents, we welcome the visit of the MQA Accreditation Panel Members scheduled for 14-15 June and look forward to a fruitful and productive two days of exchange with academic peers. Based on the very complimentary oral report from members of the earlier Academic Performance Audit on WOU's QA system and practice, we have good reasons to look forward to a similarly positive outcome in this programme accreditation exercise.

In a related event, our University will be partnering with the Commonwealth of Learning (COL), the developer and 'owner' of the programmes, to host meetings of the CeMBA/CeMPA Academic Board and Executive Board in our main campus from 9-12 August 2010. These meetings are expected to be attended by more than 20 Vice Chancellors and Deans from partner institutions in Asia, Africa, the Caribbean and the Pacific Islands. The meetings are expected to review and further strengthen and enhance the quality of the two programmes.

The July semester will see the launch of two new programmes (B Ed Primary Ed and PG Dip Ed) by the newly established School of Education, Languages and Communications. Other new degree programmes include the BA (Hons) in Psychology by SFLS and BB (Hons) in Corporate Administration and BB (Hons) in Entrepreneurship and Small Business Management by the SBA. All these new programmes will enable WOU to provide a wider spectrum of programme offerings to address the diverse needs of the country's adult workforce.

In addition, the University will also be making available to all its academics, tutors and students the free use of 'Turnitin', an anti-plagiarism software, as part of an initiative to promote the development of a culture of academic integrity and the respect of intellectual property rights amongst its learning community. This will be accompanied by a campaign to educate the WOU learning community against plagiarism. Hopefully, the success of

this initiative will soon allow us to proudly claim that 'WOU students do not engage in plagiarism!'

The Global Learn Asia Pacific conference and workshops held on 17 - 20 May 2010 at Parkroyal Hotel and Holiday Inn Penang were organised by the Association for the Advancement of Computing in Education (AACE) to further the advancement and innovation in learning and technology. Open University Malaysia (OUM), Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) and Wawasan Open University (WOU) jointly served as the local hosts. The objective of the event was to bring together educators, researchers, consultants, policymakers, entrepreneurs as well as those involved in training and academic resource development to exchange and share information and ideas on learning and technology.

As the information superhighway reaches new heights and breaches boundaries, there is a need to involve all resources made available to the educational community by the IT world to further the advancement and innovation in learning and technology. The four-day event attended by over 500 participants from 48 countries, saw international academicians and IT experts presenting their research findings, ideas and products used to facilitate learning through technology. There was a great interest among the participants in mobile learning, sustainability in education, open educational resources (OERs), cloud computing and blended learning.

Among the keynote speakers were Prof James Taylor from the University of Southern Queensland, Australia who spoke about *Sustainable Higher Education Learning Futures*, Prof Asha Kanwar, Commonwealth of Learning, Canada who shared her experience and expertise on *Towards Sustainable OERs: A Perspective from the Global South*, Prof Cathleen Norris, University of North Texas, and Prof Elliot Soloway, University of Michigan, USA sharing their views on *Educating the Mobile Generation: It is Inevitable* that Cellphone Computers will be Used in Education and Prof Emeritus Tan Sri Anuwar Ali of OUM who spoke about Teaching Learning Framework through the Power of Innovation. Among the invited speakers were Prof Paul Kim of Stanford University, USA and Prof Jan Herrington of Murdoch University, Australia who shed some new light on how mobile technology can be used to facilitate independent learning and Andrew Mitchell, representing Google, who introduced the latest cloud computing concepts using Google apps.

WOU played an active role in the successful organisation of the entire event as Vice Chancellor Prof Dr Wong Tat Meng served on the organising committee. Ishan Abeywardena of the School of Science and Technology (SST) and Deehbanjli Lakshmayya of the School of Business and Administration (SBA) also contributed as members of the secretariat committee while Prof Tham Choy Yoong, Dean of the SST, attended the conference and represented WOU. Brian Goh Jin Yong, Zamakhshari Gany Abbasgany, Tang Chong Ling and Khor Kok Yeow of ITS were also present to provide technical support to the participants.

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WOU forum on the first stage of the New Economic Model

The recent announcement of the New Economic Model (NEM) by Prime Minister Datuk Seri Najib Tun Razak led to a number of reactions. The NEM unveiled by the PM - the first stage of a two-stage approach – is a result of deliberations between the National Economic Advisory Council (NEAC) and the business community and cabinet members.

Recognising the need for a platform to discuss issues pertaining to the NEM, the Centre for Public Policy Studies (CPPS), along with SEDAR Institute and Wawasan Open University (WOU) organised a forum on the 'First Stage of the NEM' on 13 April 2010 held at the KL Campus.

In his welcoming remarks CPPS chairman, Tan Sri Dr Ramon Navaratnam, said that it was timely to hold a seminar on the NEM and that the government and Prime Minister deserved credit for conceptualising the first stage of the NEM as a shift from the New Economic Policy (NEP). Senator Tan Sri Dr Koh Tsu Koon, Minister in the Prime Minister's Department, explained the importance of the NEM in this period of Malaysia's history for its balanced approach towards achieving high incomes, sustainability and inclusiveness.

The three themes spearheading the NEM – high income, sustainability and inclusiveness – were echoed continuously throughout the forum which was divided into a two-

panel session. The first session entitled 'Enhancing Economic Competitiveness and High Income Economy', was moderated by Dato' Dr Michael Yeoh, CEO of Asian Strategy & Leadership Institute (ASLI). The panel comprised Datuk Nicholas Zefferys, President of American Malaysian Chamber of Commerce; Dato' Dr R Thillainathan, Past President of Malaysia Economic Association; Aimi Aizal Nasharuddin, President, Co-Founder and Group Exco of Skali; and Teoh Kok Lin, Founder, Chief Investment Officer of Singular Asset Management Sdn Bhd.

The second panel discussion focused on 'Developing Creativity and Innovation, Rethinking Human Capital Development' with the Director of CPPS, Ng Yeen Seen, moderating the session and U K Menon, Deputy Vice Chancellor of WOU; Prof Norma Mansor, Secretary to the NEAC; Tunku Alizakri Raja Muhammad Alias, Deputy Director Strategic Management Department of Bank Negara Malaysia; and Datuk Dr Denison Jayasooria, Member of National IT Council and Principal Research Fellow of KITA (Institute of Ethnic Studies) of Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia as the panelists.

The lively session attended by over 120 participants came to an end after concluding remarks by Dato' Mah Siew Keong, Chairman of SEDAR Institute.


physically challenged, who can study at their own pace at a location of their choice.

Bright minds

Mind mapping for better memory and interaction

WOU's Penang Student Association (PSA) in collaboration with the Penang Regional Office organised a one-day workshop on Buzan Mind Mapping (Tertiary Level) at the main campus on 7 March 2010, led by Dr Janice Toh Guat Guan, a Buzan licensed instructor.

The workshop aimed to help participants discover their brain functions and encourage creativity, reflective thinking and independent thinking. The participants also learned how mind mapping could be used to sharpen their learning, memory and thinking skills.

An active "mind mapper" herself, Dr Janice is living proof that mind mapping is not a fad and she shared how she used mind mapping techniques during her PhD viva. "I was able to map the information in my head and just retrieve what I needed when questions were posed by the panel of interviewers," she said confidently.

Mind mapping is a creativity and productivity enhancing skill relevant to today's workplace where employees are supposed to think "outside the box". "With a little practice, you will be able to see the wonders of mind mapping in your life and unleash the infinite potentials within your brain," said Dr Janice, who is also a WOU tutor.

Among the workshop participants was PSA president Chan Lee Chin, who found the session extremely beneficial as it "opens up the mind and helps to simplify complicated things or to communicate difficult concepts in a manner easy for people to understand. It breaks down details into specific key words or characters in one mind map."

Chan said mind mapping helps her to capture and convey the key points of information, adding that this comes in handy when dealing with kids at home, or with suppliers and vendors in her line of work.





WOU offers more new Degree, Graduate Diploma and Certificate Programmes

WOU is introducing two innovative new programmes at the sub-degree level from the July 2010 semester, to provide quicker upward mobility for working adults. The Graduate Diploma and Graduate Certificate programmes are specially developed to provide additional exit points along the ladder of academic pursuit, enabling more adult learners the flexible opportunity of progressively raising their levels of personal and professional achievements. From the July 2010 semester, three new degree programmes will also be available.



POST-GRADUATE DIPLOMA IN EDUCATION

The Post-Graduate Diploma in Education programme is designed to meet the needs of an increasing number of graduates from various disciplines who have entered into the teaching profession without any formal qualifications in education. This planned 33-credit programme will provide both paedagogical content and skills for graduates from various disciplines to upgrade the quality of their teaching.



BACHELOR OF ARTS (HONS) IN PSYCHOLOGY

This new programme is designed to provide students with an introduction to psychology with an emphasis on the physical, emotional, intellectual, social and cultural aspects of human development. Graduates will have the necessary skills to communicate and counsel effectively with different levels of people in different settings; demonstrate logical reasoning, critical thinking and analytical skills.

Psychology graduates can choose from a wide range of career options such as social workers, career counsellors, motivators, researchers and trainers.



The Graduate Certificate programme is a 37-credit hour course that can be completed in three semesters or 1.5 years.

Students can complete the 70-credit hour Graduate Diploma course in three years – six semesters or 108 weeks – or stretch their studies as long as they want.

For Degree programmes, students need to study for at least five years before they can be awarded a degree.

The self-paced learning at WOU allows students to plan and develop their own study schedule to suit their personal and work commitments.





BACHELOR OF EDUCATION (HONS) IN PRIMARY EDUCATION

With this programme, in-service primary school teachers and those interested in teaching young children have the opportunity for professional upgrading without having to leave their workplace, families or geographical location. Teachers with a Diploma in Education and a Certificate of Education will receive credit transfers.

Graduates from this programme can seek appointments as Graduate Teachers in primary schools or undertake postgraduate studies to advance their career in the field of education.



GRADUATE DIPLOMA IN SUPPLY CHAIN MANAGEMENT

WOU students will learn basic supply chain management and be able to apply rudimentary knowledge of law, human resource and other related business disciplines to their day-to-day working environment. It will also equip them with the skills to participate as team members in the design and strategic implementation of more effective supply chain operations.

This Graduate Diploma programme is suitable for students interested in working in logistics, procurement, transportation companies and warehousing related industries.



GRADUATE CERTIFICATE IN LOGISTICS MANAGEMENT

Students will acquire basic knowledge in broad areas of business disciplines as well as skills and competencies in operational level logistics and supply chain management. At the end of the programme, students will be able to apply basic knowledge of the principles of management, human resource and logistic business related disciplines to the day-to-day operations of their business organisations.

Upon graduation, students will be suitable for positions in manufacturing and service companies, multinational distribution centres, trading companies, courier service companies, forwarder/shipping/airline companies, logistics service providers, port authorities, armed forces and transportation agencies.

STOU visit WOU

Visit by Thai university provides a platform for exchange



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Wawasan Open University hosted a delegation of staff members from the International Affairs office of Sukhothai Thammathirat Open University (STOU). The eight-member team from Thailand, led by STOU's Head of International Affairs, Sukanya Phromphon, were on a two-day study tour to institutions of higher learning in Malaysia.

WOU Vice Chancellor Prof Dr Wong Tat Meng welcomed the delegation and chaired an informal discussion, also attended by members of WOU's Corporate Communications team.

After the brief exchange of ideas, Corporate Communications manager Lim Yao-han gave a PowerPoint presentation on WOU's strategic endeavours in forging international, corporate and community relations. It was an eyeopener for all as the interactive session served as a platform for both parties to share their experiences and contributions in providing open distance education.

STOU learned about WOU's efforts in reaching out to the public through unique marketing approaches including the online Post-a-Postcard contest, the WOU Learning Carnival, WOU Revolution! and the Red FM and Suria FM radio contests.

Meanwhile the STOU delegates shared information about their prison inmates programme and staff exchange initiatives

through the University Mobility in Asia and the Pacific (UMAP), a voluntary association non-government and government representatives of the university sector in the Asia Pacific region.

The half-day visit to the main campus culminated with a tour of the campus followed by lunch attended by Prof Wong, former Vice Chancellor Tan Sri Emeritus Prof Gajaraj Dhanarajan, Assistant Vice Chancellor (Academic Support) Prof Dato' Dr Ho Sinn Chye, School of Foundation and Liberal Studies dean Prof Mogana Dhamotharan and representatives from Corporate Communications.

STOU president Assoc Prof Dr Pranee Sungkatavat extended an invitation for WOU to visit STOU which was delivered by Sukanya, the head of the Thai delegation.



Achieving customer service excellence

Twenty-three frontline employees of Wawasan Open University attended the inaugural hands-on customer service workshop. The workshop was organised to encourage them to think outside the box, enhance their communication skills, and to improve their customer understanding to provide the best help possible.



The two-day workshop on 'Prospecting Customers Through Excellent Customer Service' was organised by WOU's Human Resources Department, and this was followed with similar sessions conducted in the Kuala Lumpur and Johor Bahru regional offices.

In opening the first workshop in Penang, Deputy Vice Chancellor (Operations) Dr Seah Soo Aun commented that staff training and development are important for a growing organisation like WOU which will continue to focus on training and development over the next few years.

"Customer service excellence is part of the University's branding. Branding is not just about marketing and advertisements but about providing a holistic experience to our customers," he clarified. He also encouraged staff to demonstrate more empathy with customers and to see things from the customers' perspective as "this will allow them to manage customers better".

The trainer Catherine Lourdes elaborated on six modules during the workshop – introduction to customer service; prospecting sales successfully; building rapport with the customer; understanding the importance of closing your sales; service breakdowns and recovery; and "working as a team".

She spoke on developing a customercentric mindset and to focus on serving the customers. She pointed out that to prospect sales successfully, one has to build a customer profile and use this data to influence or draw their interest to a product. On the topic of building rapport with the customer, Lourdes mentioned the importance of establishing trust and of simple gestures like handshakes, using names, sincerity and friendliness, affirmation and creating small talk to establish common ground.

She explained that staff should be able to recognise an opportunity, create a perfect offering, develop customer loyalty, identify buying signals with closing questions, and use the "closing strategy" of repeating things for the purpose of closing sales.

The workshop was attended by 14 RO staff from Ipoh, Johor Bahru, Kota Bharu, Kuching and Penang, including PGRO director K Manoharan and assistant manager Teh Kim Kow, while the rest of the participants were from General Services and Administration, and Marketing.







ICTs in higher education shifts focus to learners

The phenomenal growth of information and communication technologies (ICTs) is transforming institutions of higher education and has shifted the focus from the teacher to the learner. Speaking on ICTs in Higher Education: Who Stands to Gain? at the main campus on 18 May, Prof Asha Kanwar, Vice President of the Commonwealth of Learning (COL), remarked that 21st century learners are young and comprise of more women.

She said everyone involved - the government, institutions of higher learning, teachers and learners - stand to gain from ICT growth but "the real beneficiaries are the learners". The emphasis of government and institutional efforts are on the learner and their learning styles, while teachers prepare study materials in multi-media formats and provide learner support services.

She commented that the 'new learner' in the early 1980s looked for new education, training and skills for personal and career advancement, while the digital natives of the 21st century are technology-savvy. She foresees the emergence of a still newer learner, the 'ultimate learner', who is groomed right from pre-school days through the school years and higher education to be a lifelong learner equipped to handle ICTs and is motivated to learn in all circumstances. On the question to what extent the 'ultimate learner' is achieved in Third World countries, she said that it is just an abstract notion now but will eventually become a reality. "In South Asia and Africa, mobile phone technology is fast spreading and learning will take place through the technology that people have access to," she clarified.

Earlier in her talk, Prof Kanwar said that analysts estimate that by 2020, 40% of the global workforce will be knowledge workers with tertiary qualifications. The World Bank finds that for countries to achieve sustainable economic development, the Age Participation Rates (APRs) of 18 – 50 years old in higher education must be 40-50%, but APRs are less than 15% of this age group in much of Asia.

She felt that building more brick and mortar institutions to cope with the rising demand will not work for most countries, and that open and distance learning emerges as a viable option as countries struggle to improve access, enhance the quality and cut the costs of higher education.

Student disciplinary regulations under the spotlight

About 28 representatives from private higher educational institutions attended the one-day programme on Implementation of Student Disciplinary Procedures in Private Higher Educational Institutions (PHEIs), organised by WOU's Centre for Professional Development and Continuing Education (PACE) at the Berjaya Times Square Convention Centre, Kuala Lumpur.

Many of the participants from Sarawak, Malacca, Penang, Kedah, Kuala Lumpur and Selangor were in charge of managing student affairs at their respective educational institutions.

WOU Deputy Vice Chancellor (Strategy, Planning and Continuing Education) U K Menon presented an overview of the legal requirements on student discipline and procedures, and a practical guide on drafting student disciplinary rules. He also spoke on the importance of student counselling, and how counselling can help tackle student indiscipline.

Meanwhile Paul Linus Andrews, Head of the Law Department, School of Business, Sunway University College looked into the general legal principles surrounding student discipline and disciplinary procedures. He highlighted the key features of natural justice and procedural fairness – the right to a fair hearing; the rule against bias; the principle of legitimate expectation; and the right to appeal.

Andrews described the right to a fair hearing and the rule against bias as the "twin pillars that support natural justice".

Menon and Andrews then conducted a joint session on internal disciplinary proceedings, the requirements under the Private Higher Educational Act 1996 including the recent June 2009 amendments, and the student's right to appeal. The amendments to the student disciplinary procedures in private colleges and universities have made it necessary for institutions to review their internal policies and

procedures to ensure compliance with the law.

PACE also held a one-day event on *Crisis Communication and Public Relations* on the importance of projecting a good corporate image and handling crises effectively.

Dr Sankaran Ramanathan, a member of the academic team that established Malaysia's first media and communications programme at Universiti Teknologi MARA, spoke on *The Changing Nature of Public Relations and Crisis Communication*. He spoke on the handling of pressures to businesses and resources, citing examples of how agencies dealt with the volcanic ash in Iceland and the related airline travel chaos, and also the H1N1 outbreak and the precautions taken by the relevant authorities in Malaysia.

Aisha Rashid, an accredited PR practitioner, in her presentation on *Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)*, stressed on the benefits of CSR to business, and the need for companies to show concern to the employees, community, and environment. "By not engaging in CSR, companies are not only under-managing their effect on society and the environment, but they are under-managing their own economic advantage," she quipped.

Senior editor of *The Star*, T Selva, in his talk on *Media Relations*, shared the dos and don'ts for better media relations and that a good media relationship is earned through mutual respect, objective approach and frankness. Among the guidelines for working with the press are: to talk from the viewpoint of public interest and not that of the organisation; if you do not want some statement quoted, don't make it; don't argue or lose your cool with a reporter; and tell the truth, even if it hurts.

Finally, Prof Dato' Mohd Hamdan Adnan, Institute of Public Relations Malaysia president, shared his thoughts on *Effective Government Relations: Dealing with authorities successfully.* He touched on legislative procedures, central agencies, public sector and the New Economic Model, and called for a better understanding of the Federal Constitution.

WOU Deputy Vice Chancellor U K Menon chaired the forum on *Public Relations in Changing Times* with the four speakers as panelists. The issues raised included the role of media reporting, future of the print media, the impact of social



networking tools and public communication with government departments/agencies.

PACE is WOU's bridge to the community and conducts training programmes for the private higher education sector in a wide range of areas, such as establishment of institutions, advertising regulations and so on.

WawasanLearn, WOU's learner management system that allows students to manage their studies and interact with tutors will be given a fresh "coat of paint" this coming July semester and the new interface is meant to further enhance students' learning experience. The new design is clean, simple and easy on the eyes while retaining the three-pane features (for the courses).

A number of changes have been made to the main page for WawasanLearn which is now segmented into fewer categories so that items can be viewed clearly. To make navigating around the site easier, the number of scrolls on the main page has been reduced.



WOU is set to introduce its latest development in courseware – the e-Textbook. More than just an electronic version of the printed textbook, the e-Textbooks by Pearson Publishing includes features that will enhance the student's learning experience, making it easier for the student to read, share and navigate through the pages. The incorporation of multimedia content provides a new dimension of learning for the student.

WOU confers Professorship

The WOU Council recently approved the conferment of the University's highest academic rank of 'Professor' on Assoc Prof Dr Malachi Edwin Vethamani, Dean of the School of Education, Languages and Communications (SELC), effective 16 April 2010

Prof Edwin, a leading expert in the field of teaching English and Literature in English, joined WOU last year after 23 years at Universiti Putra Malaysia (UPM) where he rose to become an Associate Professor at the Faculty of Educational Studies. He holds a PhD in Literature in English from University of Nottingham, UK, and was a Chevening Award (1993-96) and Fulbright (2000) scholar.

He is the current Vice President of the Asian Association of Teachers of English as a Foreign Language (Asia TEFL); he was also president of the Malaysian English Language Teaching Association (MELTA) for seven years before being appointed its advisor.



organised a month-long charity drive in conjunction with the Chinese New Year celebrations to raise funds for the Shan Children's Home in Tanjung Tokong. On 13 March 2010, SRC members handed over RM1,500 in cash and essential items during their visit.

Shan Children's Home is currently home to 22 children aged between 9 – 14 years, and it hopes to accommodate up to 40 children once its financial condition improves. The Home,

which officially opened on 14 December 2008, looks after orphans and neglected children of all backgrounds and is run by a team of dedicated full-time staff, assisted by volunteers, under the management of executive administrator Dr S Poornachandran.

SRC president Dr Andy Liew led a five-member team to the Home and presented stationery, clothing and food items, as well as treat the children to a fast food lunch. According to Dr Andy, "This is part of SRC's community services project and a simple gesture from the University

to give back to society."

In 2009, the SRC visited some 200 folks at the Silver Jubilee Home for the Aged. He said that the SRC chose the Children's Home this time around as "the newly-established home urgently requires public support to sustain their daily activities". The Home solely depends on donations from well-wishers to cater to the physical, emotional and educational needs of the children.

Stepping Up Innovation For Economic Growth

Malaysia has the capacity to unleash its innovation potential to enhance its competitiveness and productivity in the global economy. "Innovation is key to Malaysia's long-term prosperity," said World Bank economist for Malaysia, Philip Schellekens during his presentation of World Bank's April 2010 Malaysia Economic Monitor themed Growth Through Innovation.

The talk was part of a public lecture series organised by Khazanah Nasional Bhd and the Socio-Economic and Environmental Research Institute (SERI) at the WOU main campus on 20 April 2010.

Schellekens clarified that innovation potential can be unleashed by improving the capabilities for innovation, the driving force of innovation, and the amplifiers of innovation. He noted that "in Malaysia, 40% who want to innovate cite lack of finances as a major obstacle to innovation activity". In reviewing Malaysia's innovation performance, he said despite product sophistication, surveys suggest limited local innovation efforts with domestic value-add remaining low. The challenge is therefore to move the nation's source of competitiveness from low-cost to high-economy.

Meanwhile SERI senior fellow Dr Lim Mah-Hui in his talk Nowhere to Hide: The Great Financial Crisis – Causes and Challenges Ahead, said that 3.4 per year, and a big financial crisis every 10 years. He urged Asia to re-look its export growth model by looking at China and other regional competitors; to re-look at capital controls as it undermines monetary policies and destabilises the real economy; and to look at alternatives to the US dollar as an international currency.

The session ended with the launch of Dr Lim's book *Nowhere to Hide* by Khazanah Board member Tan Sri Andrew Sheng, Bukit Bendera MP Liew Chin Tong, SERI chairman Dato' Dr Sharom Ahmat, and the author. About 200 people attended the lecture, including Dato' Seri Stephen Yeap and WOU Vice Chancellor Prof Dr Wong Tat Meng.





Dean of SELC, Prof Dr Malachi Edwin Vethamani, a renowned expert in the teaching of the English Language and literature, conducted the workshop which was only open to PELLTA members.

He urged the teachers to play their roles in encouraging students to develop a lifelong reading habit and not just for the purpose of passing examinations only.

The session began with the reading of two poems, after which the participants were introduced to the different teaching activities they could

carry out in the classroom. Feedback from the participants was positive. Zarina Hashim, a teacher from SMK Mak Mandin in Butterworth found the workshop to be an eye-opener as it gave her more creative teaching ideas.

Steven Grumach, a retired civil servant and former journalist from Bukit Mertajam, felt he achieved a better understanding about the teaching of literature, thanks to the workshop. Grumach who is now a private tutor said, "I'll

use the strategies I learnt to help my students relate better to the literary texts."

SELC, with the collaboration of WOU's Centre for Professional Development and Continuing Education (PACE) based in Kuala Lumpur, regularly conducts training workshops and seminars in specialised areas of English teaching.

Not allowing his extreme, often difficult, working conditions to stand in his path towards earning a quality university degree, Ralpheal Louis Ubok is determined to rise further in his studies while holding down a tough job - all thanks to WOU.

The 28-year-old has been working as an operation instrumentation technician with Sarawak Shell Bhd for three years now. Far removed from a cushy office environment, he works at an oil platform in the South China Sea about 200km offshore from Bintulu.

Ralpheal admitted he was elated when WOU opened up a regional office in Kuching last October. "This is a dream come true for Sarawakians to achieve their goals and ambitions." He enrolled for the Bachelor of Technology (Hons) in Electronics programme, and is proud to be among the inaugural batch of students from East Malaysia.

According to Ralpheal, WOU offers "the best mode of studies compared to other open universities". He added, "WOU has provided me with the chance to continue my studies in the field that I love, Electronics. I am studying again, and I can actually put into practice what I learn even before graduation!"

On how he manages to work and study, Ralpheal explained that the offshore rig where he works has Internet connections and telephone services on board, allowing him to surf WOU's learning management system (LMS) and student portal at any time he wishes. After his 6am-6pm working shift and dinner, he spends a few hours reading his course materials and textbooks, doing

During his two weeks off every month when he is onshore, Ralpheal concentrates more on his studies, family and friends. He proudly quipped that "choosing to study with WOU was really the best choice that I've made!"

"Don't stop believing, hold on to that feeling," is tutor Fan Kok Keong's advice to all working adults who want to enhance their skills and knowledge. His quote is from the popular TV musical series Glee and he wants more students to embrace this thinking.

Having taught students, teachers and working adults - and considering his role as an educator to be his "true calling" -Fan knows that when students sign up to study at WOU they believe that they can achieve their dreams. However with deadlines, work commitments, personal commitments and family demands, the initial confidence starts to wane. He tells adult learners "to hold on to that feeling - the feeling that they can succeed" even during stressful moments.

He added, "I would like to see all my students graduate from WOU with a degree, equipped with the relevant skills and the confidence to succeed at the workplace." Fan has conducted tutorials on Communication Skills for the
